Carbon-Monoxide Warning

Due to extreme cold and power outages, please be aware of the hazards of the following types of heating:



- ♦ Never use gas grills, propane grills, charcoal grills in a house, garage or enclosed area;
- ♦ All gas fire heaters **MUST** be vented to the outside to remove carbon monoxide from an enclosed area; and

♦ Please read and follow all manufacturer instructions for any heater. Also, be careful with your heaters, fireplaces and candles.

Home and apartment fires are more common during the winter because of improperly used heating equipment, fireplaces and candles. Be sure anything that can burn is at least three (3) feet away from fireplaces or space heaters. Fireplaces should be inspected by a professional every year and cleaned when necessary, and make sure fires are fully extinguished before you go to bed.

It's important your home has working smoke alarms and your family knows how to escape a fire safely.

Code Enforcement

Help beautify Blanchard! It is a violation of the Municipal Code of any of the following:

- * Allow the accumulation of trash and/or debris and our junk on your property.
- * Allow tall weeds or grass (including edges along the street and sidewalk) to exceed 12-inches or higher.
- * Accumulation of inoperable and/or junk vehicles and parts on your property.
- * Parking of trailers, boats, and RVs in alleyways or in front of the building line.
- * Allowing tree limbs over hang the street with less than 8-foot clearance.
- * Failure to trim trees, grass and weeds in alleys or between sidewalk and pavement.
- * Leaving grass in the street after mowing.
- * Watering lawn every day or out of odd/even sequence.

Daylite Saving Time Begins



SPRING FORWARD SUNDAY, March 9th, Daylight Saving Time begins at **2 a.m.** when clocks will "spring forward" one-hour. The exceptions are Arizona, Hawaii, Puerto Rico, the Virgin Islands, and American Samoa. Credit for Daylite Saving Time belongs to Benjamin

Franklin, who first suggested the idea in 1784. The idea was revised in 1907, when William Willett, an Englishman, proposed a similar system in the pamphlet 'The Waste of Daylight'. The Germans were the first to officially adopt the light-extending system in 1915 as a fuel-saving measure during World War 1. The British switched one year later, and the United States followed in 1918, when Congress passed the Standard Time Act, which established our time zones. This experiment lasted only until 1920, when the law was repealed due to opposition from dairy farmers [cows don't pay attention to clocks]. During World War II, Daylight Saving Time was imposed once again [this time year around] to save fuel.

The Oklahoma Corporation Commission reported that no new oil wells permitted or completed in Blanchard since **Friday, February 21st**.

PC Action

The Planning Commission held its regular meeting on **Thursday, February 27th** and discussed, considered and took appropriate action on the following items:

🌀 **TABLED** Resolution No. 2025-04, recommending approval of a zoning reclassification from the A-1, Agricultural zoning district to the R-E, Residential Estates zoning district on a property of 2.50 acres, located at 268 NE 70th St, within Section 31-T9N-R4W, McClain County, Oklahoma.

Shop Local

Here's what happens when you "shop local."

1. For every \$100 you spend at locally owned businesses, \$68 stays in Blanchard. What happens when you spend that same \$100 at a national chain? Only \$43 stays in the community*.

2. You wouldn't want your house to look like everyone else's in the U.S. So why would you want your community to look that way?

3. Local businesses are better at creating higher-paying jobs for your neighbors. When you shop locally, you help create jobs for firemen, police officers, and many other essential professions.

4. Buying from a locally owned business conserves energy and resources in the form of less fuel for transportation and less packaging.

5. Local business owners know you, and you know them. Studies have shown that local businesses donate to community causes at more than twice the rate of chains.

6. Shopping in a local business district means less infrastructure, less maintenance, and more money available to beautify the community. Also, spending locally instead of online ensures that your sales taxes are reinvested where they belong - in Blanchard.

🌀 **APPROVED** Resolution No. 2025-01, recommending an ordinance to the City Council amending Sections 4-309 and 4-310 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Blanchard, Oklahoma, concerning sign regulations.

🌀 **APPROVED** Resolution No. 2025-02, recommending an ordinance to the City Council adding new Section 22-206 to the Code of Ordinances of the City of Blanchard, Oklahoma, establishing regulations for Simplified Plats.

🌀 **APPROVED** Resolution No. 2025-03 recommending and ordinance to the City Council adding new Sections 16-214 and 16-307, and amending Section 22-327 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Blanchard, Oklahoma, concerning installation of utility infrastructure.
